Draft Biodiversity Plan.

Introduction – WMPC Statutory Duty. Under the 2021 Environment Act, public authorities (including town and parish councils) operating in England must consider what they can do to conserve and enhance biodiversity.

Government guidance published on 17 May 2023 clarifies that, as a public authority, town and parish councils must:

- Consider what they can do to conserve and enhance biodiversity.
- Agree policies and specific objectives based on their consideration.
- Act to deliver their policies and achieve their objectives.

Town and parish councils, unlike other authorities, are not obliged to publish a report on their actions, but the Government guidance requires all public authorities to complete their first consideration of what action to take for biodiversity by 1 January 2024. They must agree their policies and objectives as soon as possible after this and must reconsider the selected actions within five years of completing their previous consideration, or more frequently if they choose.

To comply with the guidance, town and parish councils could as a minimum:

- Have biodiversity as an agenda item for a meeting before the end of 2023.
- Note what action they are already taking to conserve and enhance biodiversity.
- Agree what further steps they should take to conserve and enhance biodiversity.

Such steps may include:

- Working with Anne Westover's report on Biodiversity dated 12.02.2024. (https://docs.google.com/document/d/1taogsGjfyj92HEI6aULRnjt2fQ9TocjwtgkeuzBPhcw/edit?usp=sharing).
- Reviewing what biodiversity or nature recovery plans are already in place from other local Authorities too, e.g. potential for jointly-supported wildlife corridors.
- Making contact with local voluntary groups working on nature conservation.
- Carrying out a biodiversity audit of council landholdings and/or the whole council area, potentially in the future to involve residents in a "BioBlitz"; a fact finding mission, using our new biodiversity map, to find out what is thriving and what needs help. This could include but not be limited to part of 'Wild About Wickham' and could enlist the help of parishioners and their children.
- Gathering expert advice on possible actions in support of biodiversity, such as from the Greenprint Forum, Transition Woodbridge and our supporters of 'Wild About Wickham'.
- Drafting an action plan that covers action that the council will take itself as well as support for the
 actions of others.

Whatever action is agreed, as a minimum local councils could ensure they address biodiversity concerns when commenting on planning applications. (We have achieved this thanks to our Neighbourhood Plan).

A proposal was put to the last environment and Leisure meeting which was agreed. As a result, I would like to propose that a Biodiversity Action Plan should be adopted by WMPC and be discussed at each Full Council Meeting, as per Government guidance, and enclose a draft action plan. Everyone's input will be most welcome. Cllr. Niki Fowler.
