WICKHAM MARKET GOOD NEIGHBOURS SCHEME



AGM: At our recent 18th AGM we heard that over the past year our 34 volunteers carried out 1,417 jobs, helping 52 people. This included 288 visits to various medical appointments (hospital, GP, dentist, optician, physiotherapy); other tasks cover shopping, fetching prescriptions, dog walking, minor DIY, visits to the hairdressers, day care centre, and social and community groups and the befrienders visits and phone calls.

The befrienders party for those living alone took place last September in the village hall and was a great success with the attendees enjoying a good chat and afternoon tea. The event was facilitated by a grant of £250 from the Council's Partnership Group. We also held a volunteers garden party last June and the committee had a pub lunch, these two events were self-funded.

We also promote our work through our presence at the summer, Christmas and spring markets on The Hill.

The Parish Council was thanked for their annual grant which helps with the main expenses like insurance and phone payments.

Sadly, it was decided at a recent committee meeting to remove befriending as one of our services to new clients. Recent requests have been beyond our remit and require more than a weekly telephone chat or visit. Volunteers are unable, unwilling or unqualified to take on a more demanding role. Also, it has become increasingly difficult, if not impossible, to recruit new volunteers. We still have 3 very loyal volunteers who go above and beyond their initial commitment. This is reflected in the huge amount of visits, phone calls, transport to appointments and, when suitable, social outings these three have undertaken between them. Their total commitment is commendable and they have indeed become good friends with their clients.

It was noted with sadness that Phil Wilsher, a regular volunteer driver, had died suddenly in March. Thanks were expressed for all his work for Good

Neighbours. Also, a former regular client and one of our befriendees, Peggy Morris, died in April.

Our guest speaker was Claire Cox, Community Police Officer, who had recently taken over responsibility for Wickham Market, Woodbridge and other small villages.

Pc Cox is part of the community policing team and her role involves engaging with the community, finding out what is happening, and seeking to solve problems. Over the next few months she plans to do more foot patrols. She was aware of some anti-social behaviour and neighbour disputes. She will be holding surgeries once a month in the Resource Centre. A new project for young children called 'Right Choices' is being rolled out to primary schools.

The evening was nicely rounded off by a glass of wine and nibbles!

What the Good Neighbour scheme can do for you.

We can provide a helping hand now and then for things such as: collecting your prescription from the pharmacy; we can change that battery or light bulb you can't quite manage; we can do local shopping for you; or we can help with that minor DIY job that is a little too much for you. This is all in addition to our driving you to appointments, clubs or society meetings or to visit a friend or relative. Whatever it is, give us a call. If we can't help you ourselves we might be able to suggest someone who can.

The phone is manned Monday – Friday between 9.00am and 5.00pm (not bank holidays) or you can leave a message. Please give us several days notice to arrange a lift (if you can) and longer for hospital or other longer appointments.

WICKHAM MARKET'S LOST PUBS

We continue this series on the lost Pubs, Inns and Hostelries of Wickham Market with a look at The White Hart, which was probably the most important hostelry in the village.

It had its own Bowling Green from a very early date; kept its own brewer; was the place patronised by the local aristocracy - the Glovers of Ashe High House, the Dukes of Hamilton from Easton Mansion; and was the place where village meetings and celebrations took place; it had an Assembly Rooms, which was the drill room in the Crimean War for the local Volunteers; Lord Nelson stayed there; it was the Coach Office and Posting House; and at least two murders took place there. In 1986/7 the brewery closed it down, and it is now divided into flat and three commercial units.

Historical records start in the reign of Henry VII:-

A 15th century will refers to "Bequest of "beddes and bedding used at the Harte for the convenience of travellers".

Pre 1504 - Richard Briggs, owner occupier, who changed the name from "The Harte" to "The White Harte"

In 1640 a reference says William Buttrum paid tax "for his Inne the White Harte and tayntour field"

In 1641 it is recorded that William Glover of Campsey Ashe High House was "unhappily slain at the White Harte, Wickham Market, 1641 by two persons". There is also a record which says "Their father was slain at the White Hart Wickham Market cowardly by 2 persons as he was pissing 1641 and was buried in the chancel under a black gravestone".

The following references have been found in the Parish Records:

In 1652 "Pd at the White Harte for one night's quarter for 9 soldiers at 4d a man 3/-".

In 1653 "A man child borne and murthered at ye White Hart born the January 27 buried February 3rd".

In 1654 "Beating of the Bounds at the perambulation, the men had dinner at the White Hart, the boys bread and beer".

In 1764 "Meeting at the White Hart to discuss the relief of the poor".

In 1766 "12/6 pd. at the White Hart for killing a mad dog". June 17th

Various directories list the former landlords of the hotel:

1844 Edward Tice proprietor, posting house, Post Office. (Mr Tice is buried in a prominent grave to the south of the church, by the gate to the Medical Centre, together with his wife, son and granddaughter).

1846 William Jackson, Commercial Inn and posting house, Coach office.

1855 Susan Chase, proprietor.

1888 Owen Albert Diver, proprietor.

1912 George Louis Zissell (He was German, and disappeared at the outbreak of war in 1914. Apparently when some British soldiers discovered that he was German, they took all his furniture onto the Market Square and burnt it).

1937 G.B. Monkham.

1950's Mr. and Mrs. Palmer. Mr. and Mrs. Fisk.

The Wickham & District Farmers Club met there and as a result, the East Suffolk Agricultural Show was held at Wickham Market in 1832, 1834, 1836, 1838, 1840, 1842, 1844 and 1849.

Cornelius Welton started farming at the Grange at Wickham Market, but by 1851 had moved to Valley Farm where he lived for some twenty years, working also as an estate agent and farming 330 acres. He was one of a group of local farmers who met regularly at the White Hart, and on 21 September 1831 they founded the East Suffolk Agricultural Association, and planned the first Suffolk Agricultural Show at Wickham Market in 1832. The very first Suffolk Show took place in Wickham Market. Kitson Court and the Car Park/Medical Centre are built on the field where it was held. The Suffolk Show was then held alternately at Wickham and Saxmundham until 1845, and once more at Wickham in 1849. Cornelius Welton was Show Secretary until 1844.

The following is an extract from the Wickham Market Gazette of April 26th, 1894 complete with he original spelling and grammar:

The White Hart Hotel is one of the free houses at the present day. It has a splendid frontage and in days gone by was all utilised as an hotel where the bank and the Reading Room is now located. Those of the present day have but a faint conception of the business transacted here in its palmy days, before the Railway took so much of the traffic off the road. This was the house for the principal coaches to stop at and a large amount of posting business was done, as this was the posting stage from Ipswich.

In the early part of the present century Mr Thomas Woodward was the landlord, who on leaving resided at Limetree Terrace. He was noted for taking his constitutional as regular as weather permitted. He was succeeded at the White Hart by Mr Edward Tice, who kept a large number of posting horses and it was no uncommon thing for them to be in requisition. Some families travelled with four horses and two postillions. The Dowager Duchess of Hamilton when staying at Easton Park was supplied with horses and riders from here. Among the postilions for which the old house was famous was John Smith, Sam Self, Sam Harper, Jim Scase, John Hall, and Tom Hear. Sometimes it was as quick as the word, and booted, spurr'd and jacketted, the horses were mounted and off they went.

William Garnham in those days was ostler and the commodious stables then stood where the Assembly Room now stands. This Garnham had two sons who made their way in the world both of them entered the army, and John rose to be a Commissioned Officer of high standing and at one time held a position in the Tower of London. George, we believe after leaving the army became Governor of a Warwick workhouse. Garnham in after years became gatekeeper at the Broadwater Crossing of the Framlingham branch railway. Other old servants in the house were Sally Broom, the cook who attired in a frill cap, was as kind hearted a soul you would find in a day's march, and of which the writer has had ample proof. Few cooks at the present day can match her. Jane Leggett also plied her vocations for a number of years, while William Thurston was one of the neatest and active of waiters. In addition to the hotel proper there was a taproom, the entrance to which was from the roadway leading to the yard.

The coach houses and the cornhouse were commodious. On one occasion when Hilton's menagerie was standing on the hill, the elephant during the time of erection was put in the coach house and sniffing the corn he very soon down with the partition so that he might help himself. An elephant in this same collection had a trick played on it by George Leggett which enraged it, and it took Leggett up with its trunk, and had it not been for the keeper would soon have made short work for him. Where Bowling Green Terrace now stands and the

gardens belonging, was formerly the Bowling Green and was much larger than the present one, and gentlemen's and tradesmen's clubs were held during the season here. The Horticultural Society held its show of cottagers productions while the gentlemen's exhibit was held in the large room at the hotel, and both of them would bear very favourable comparison with the shows of the present day, and as fine a collection of flowers, fruit and vegetables were brought together as could wish to see.

Where Mr Rush now resides was formerly stables, and the beerhouse now held by him was formerly worked by the tenant at the hotel, and much of the ale consumed was home made. Will Hearn at one time was the brewer, and like a brewer's cask was largest in the middle. Will was a somewhat remarkable man and was known by the names of "Betts and Berry", as those were the names of the two horses which he once kept. He also boasted that he had tamed a wolf. On one occasion he was relating this to a stranger who could not credit it, Will took him home to see it, and when there, showed him his wife who rejoiced in the name of Wolf before she married Will. The family of this man was somewhat remarkable, although illiterate. Charles the eldest, at one time did a considerable business in rough timber, supplying the herring curers at Aldeburgh. On one occasion Charles had to appear before the Magistrates at Woodbridge as a witness, when the public press spoke of him as an unsophisticated looking rustic. Tom another son devoted his time mostly to the White Hart as an assistant ostler. Harry better known as "Major", was for many years with Messrs. Whitmore and Binyon. He was a far seeing man and a tower of strength in himself, and possessed an amount of ingenuity that many would not have given him credit for. He met his death by an accident at Cardiff a few years since.

Since Mr Tice's days the White Hart has had various occupants, Mr Coles, Mr Jackson, Mrs Delph, Mrs Chase, and its present occupier Mr O. A. Diver. Very few houses are better known to the commercial traveller, and very few present a more cheery and neat appearance. In fact, on a small scale, it is a local museum of curiosities tastefully arranged, and everything about the place denote cleanliness and order as far as an Hotel can have it. The old clock in the kitchen we should say if it could speak could tell us of events that transpired some centuries ago. Here, Lord Nelson, the naval hero, once called when passing through the town; but old time with his scythe has since then mowed many down; and for want of time we reserve our further remarks on the public houses for our next articles.


